



- River Authorities Cities






Bottom-Up Regional Approach





Population Growth











Supply and Demand








Bottom-Up Regional Approach




Demand by Region and Category







TWDB Financial Assistance Programs

State Water Implementation Fund for Texas (SWIFT)

- We link planning to financing
 - Project included in State Water Plan
 - Eligible for SWIFT financing
- Success story
 - About \$11 billion in commitments since 2015
 - -1.5 million acre-feet new water supply created
 - -\$1.2 billion in savings vs. open market



SWIFT Program Timeline

- December: Abridged application period beings
- February: Abridged applications due
- Spring:
 - Abridged applications scored
 - Invitations extended to submit full application
- Summer:
 - Complete applications due
 - TWDB board makes financial commitments
- Fall/Winter:
 - TWDB bond sale / Borrowers close on funds

Drinking Water SRF

 Low-cost financing for a wide range of water projects that **facilitate compliance** with drinking water standards

- Through FY22:
 - -About \$3.6 billion has been committed
 - Over 750 projects in Texas


Clean Water SRF

- Low-cost financing for a wide range of wastewater, stormwater, reuse, and other pollution control projects
- Facilitate compliance with the federal Clean Water Act

- Through FY22:
 - Over \$11 billion has been committed
 - About 1,200 projects in Texas



SRF Program Timeline



Economically Distressed Areas Program

- Who the program serves:
 - Median household income below 75% of the state median income
 - First-time water or wastewater service
 - Or failing wells or failing on-site sewer
- 70% grant / 30% loan
- Local county must adopt and enforce model subdivision rules

Agricultural Water Conservation

- Grants and loans for conservation projects
- Examples
 - Irrigation system improvements
 - Demonstrations
 - Equipment cost share
- Annual program cycle
 - Request for applications late fall
 - Applications due in February
 - Grants awarded in May






- 15 regional flood planning groups
 - -Held 525 meetings over three years
 - -Over 360 total members
- Regional flood plans adopted at the July TWDB board meeting
 - —Over **\$48 billion** total capital cost
- First State Flood Plan: September 2024



TWDB Budget

Project Funding

- \$1 billion Texas Water Fund
- \$625 million Flood Infrastructure Fund
- \$125 million Federal match for SRF programs

Employees

- 5% pay raise across the board
- \$3 million: Targeted salary increases for key positions
- Funding for about 80 new positions

SB 28 / Proposition 6

- Created the Texas Water Fund
- **\$1 billion** deposit
- Resounding approval from voters
 - 78% voted for Prop 6
 - 1.97 million votes
- \$750 million to supplement TWDB programs that already exist
- \$250 million: New Water Supply for Texas Fund

Texas Water Fund: Uses

- May only be used to transfer money to the following funds or accounts:
 - New Water Supply for Texas Fund (brand new fund)
 - State Water Implementation Fund for Texas (SWIFT)
 - Drinking Water and Clean Water State Revolving Funds (SRF)
 - Rural Water Assistance Fund
 - Texas Water Development Fund II
 - Statewide water public awareness account



Texas Water Fund: Priorities

- Specifically mentioned in SB 28:
 - Rural communities
 - -Cities under 150,000 population
 - Projects where all permitting is complete
 - Statewide public awareness campaign
 - Water conservation strategies
 - Water loss mitigation projects



New Water Supply for Texas Fund

- Goal: create new water supply sources for TX
- \$250 million deposit
- Examples:
 - Desalination (both seawater and brackish) groundwater)
 - Produced water treatment
 - Aquifer storage and recovery
- Public-private partnerships allowed
